SOCIETY SHOWS

The show season will hopefully return to some level of normality next year. Unfortunately there are some shows that won't run, but we have also been contacted by other shows wishing to hold Longhorn classes if there are sufficient entries. An up to date list will be on the website in the new year.

The Midland and Northern regional groups are hoping to pool their resources to hold a showing workshop in 2022, more info when plans are in place.

The National Show is at Suffolk Show on 31 May - 1 June. It's in a four year TB test area with excellent facilities so please consider entering - don't be daunted by the title 'National Show', all are welcome!

The Trustees have agreed to reinstate an Exhibitor Support Grant. A payment of £10 per entry per day (cow and calf is one entry) up to a maximum of four entries per exhibitor will be available for any show with Longhorn classes using a judge from the Longhorn judges' panel. Any member who is in either their first or second year of showing (the years do not have to be consecutive) is eligible. Please contact the office for more info.



IMPORT AND EXPORT REGULATIONS

The following import and export arrangements will apply from 1 January 2022

Imports and exports (reciprocal arrangement)

Export certificates

All animals sold for export from the United Kingdom require an exportation certificate duly certified by the Society. Fees chargeable for exportation certificates shall be as agreed by the Council.

Breed requirements in respect of imported genetics

- It is important for members importing genetics to arrange with vendors that all documentation required by The Longhorn Cattle Society in the UK is provided, thus allowing the acceptance of imported animals into the UK herd book.
- It is also essential the vendor in the country of origin provides their domestic registration authority (if applicable) with details of genetics being sold for export. Please note the responsibility for ensuring this action is taken must lie with the breeder purchasing the genetics.
- The Longhorn Cattle Society will enter into the main Herdbook, animals of the same breed, that are eligible for entry under the Society's breed criteria, without discrimination on account of their country of origin.

Listed below are the documents The Longhorn Cattle Society in the UK requires:

- (i) Five generation extended pedigree. In the case of embryos, both sire and donor dam must be provided.
- (ii) Official export certificate issued by the recognised registration authority providing full details of both breeder/vendor and purchaser.
- (iii) Should any female be in-calf, the same information as points (i) and (ii) above will be required in respect of the service sire/s.
- (iv) In the case of all genetic imports including live animals, service sires, semen and sires and donor dams of embryos, a single nucleotide polymorphisms (54K SNP) DNA profile must be provided (showing parentage verification.)
- (v) In the case of embryos, a certificate/form issued by the embryo company confirming the identity and details of the sires used and donor dams.
- (vi) An initial entry/export fee as decreed by Council is to be paid per animal, including service sire/donor dam/semen

GRANT SCHEME AVAILABLE

Do you need a new crush or handling facilities? Would you like to make things easier and safer with a security camera?

Round one of two categories of Government grants have opened and will close in January.

A minimum grant of £2000 up to £25,000 for the Farming Equipment Technology Fund, and up to £500,000 for the Farming Transformation Fund.

TB COMPENSATION

Whilst the eradication of Bovine TB should be at the forefront of APHA's minds, it's inexorable creep across the country means more and more members are being affected.

A quick look at the difference between the compensation you will receive for a registered pedigree animal and a non pedigree animal might make registration of all your calves a consideration. Retrospective pedigree registration of TB reactors is not permitted and APHA will usually check the online database when a reactor is confirmed to check it's status.

The table for compensation is updated each month on the DEFRA website and is applicable for all breeds and is not breed specific to Longhorns. The table is applicable to England only - Wales and Northern Ireland are on individual valuation and Scotland is TB free.

Further detailed explanation and the most recent compensation table is available on the DEFRA website, and the website www.tbhub.co.uk also has current information.

GENUS DISTRIBUTION FEES

Genus have updated their distribution fees, which the Society pass on at cost. From 1 August 2021:

To a Genus AI technician, £4.20 per straw with a minimum transaction charge of £42 and a maximum charge of £630

To an on-farm (DIY) flask, £4.20 per straw with a minimum transaction charge of £63 and maximum charge of £630

OVERSEAS OPPORTUNITIES FOR LONGHORN GENETICS

The Society has been involved in the very early stages of a UK submission to China to import UK breed genetics to that vast country. The current beef industry has followed the US model of feedlots for a number of years, and this method of beef production is being seen as

unsustainable in terms of the climate, and the Chinese wish to make more use of the vast areas of grassland they have. Many areas in China have similar climate to the UK. There is a lot of work going on via DEFRA to get UK genetics into the Chinese market. This is a very long term project which may not come to fruition for a few years, but could be a real opportunity for members to export semen and embryos. The need for genetics is vast and with all the UK beef breeds participating there would be plenty of business to go round.

In addition there is interest from Australia for fresh genetics to prevent inbreeding of the stock already there.

If you are interested in exploring this matter further, and wish to learn more about the commercial opportunities of taking semen and embryos from your cattle for both domestic and export purposes, please get in touch. If there is sufficient interest the Society will organise a seminar with industry professionals.



LATE REGISTRATIONS - RULE CHANGE

The Society receives a number of applications to register females over 12 months old each year; in many cases they are heifers who were overlooked for registration when they were younger and only when they've calved and their offspring need registering is the oversight spotted!

The integrity of the Herdbook is the primary concern of the Trustees and ensuring the accuracy of all animals being registered is paramount. First-calved females are usually over three years old, and it isn't compulsory to put the sire on the passport when registering animals with BCMS, so it's easy to forget or misremember who the sire of the heifer is when you apply to the Society for late registration.

In order to ensure the Society maintains an accurate Herdbook, the Trustees have agreed the following rule amendment, which started on 1st September 2021.

All females over 12 months old at the date of registration will be subject to full DNA parent verification, at cost to the breeder unless:

The animal was already birth notified before they were 12 months old or The passport shows the eartag numbers of both the sire and the dam

Remember that birth notification is **free of charge** for both males and females, whereas parent verification could cost you over £80, plus the late registration fee of £120

FEMALE REGISTRATION & PARENT VERIFICATION

The purity of the Longhorn breed is one of it's major selling points and to verify this each 100th female registered is required to be parent verified. The office will contact the breeder as soon as possible after the registration has been received to ask for hair samples from the calf, and her sire and dam if their DNA samples are not already held on file by the Society. Should the sire not be on the holding then the current owner will be asked to provide a sample if one is not already held. DNA samples of all AI bulls are already held and if the bull is dead then a sibling or close relative may be sought.

Trustees also reserve the right to parent verify other females at random.

BULL REGISTRATIONS



BULL REGISTRATION & PARENT VERIFICATION

All bulls being fully registered with the Society require full parentage testing. This complements the existing parentage testing regime of each 100th heifer registered.

As a result of this testing a small number of bulls have not been able to be sire verified as they were not by the sire the breeder thought they were by, and the true sire could not be identified. This has resulted in the bulls not being able to be used for pedigree breeding.

Please consider sending hair samples of bulls you may wish to register to the Society in advance (along with the sire and dam), so the parentage can be verified before the registration form is sent in. If the bull is then registered the costs of the parent verification will be absorbed in the cost of the registration. If hair samples are submitted in advance but the bull is subsequently not registered then the member will be charged for the testing at cost, (currently £23 plus VAT per hair sample and parentage test).

The Society has been collecting DNA from bulls being registered since 2012 (around registration number 23000/) and it is hoped that most of these hair samples can be used to prove the sire, but the Society has moved from Microsatellite testing to 'SNPS' testing which requires a more robust sample. This may mean that along with dam hair samples, repeat bull hair samples may be required.

Contact the office or download an updated registration form from the website (go into Join Us and then Forms) This gives instructions of how to take the hair samples. Contact the office if you require sample bags - potentially three bags per registration - one for the bull being registered, one for his sire and one for his dam

Also on the Forms page is the minimum weight for age chart on the next page so you can easily calculate what your bull needs to weigh at any given age in order to meet the minimum weight requirements for registration.



BULL REGISTRATION MINIMUM WEIGHTS

Bulls that are proposed to be kept for breeding must be inspected by a practising veterinary surgeon prior to registration and a registration form completed. Application for registration should reach the Society office when the animal is between 365 and 800 days of age, or if the bull has reached the minimum weight of 431kg before it is 365 days old then registration may be applied for at that time. It must be inspected by a vet by 800 days of age and must have reached a minimum adjusted weight of 431 kg at 400 days, with 1kg per day adjustment for bulls over 400 days up to 631 kg at 600 days and 0.5kg per day adjustment for bulls between 600 and 800 days of age up to 731kg at 800 days. Applications must be made within one month of the bull being weighed and inspected by the vet. All bulls must adhere to the breed standards

Around 60 members, friends and guests came along to the Society's AGM weekend herd visit to Mike Winterton's Wanlip herd. We saw two batches of cows with calves at foot and then the bulling heifers before returning to the farm to have lunch of Longhorn beef and burgers.

The Winterton family have owned Willows Farm for three generations, starting with Mike's grandfather and then added to by Mike's father and then Mike himself. Bounded by the River Wreake and the River Soar the land was used for gravel extraction up until the 1950's and has since been reinstated to pasture, with hedges and coppices also planted. Much of the land is prone to flooding and this winter has been particularly trying. Many of the old gravel pits are now ponds and lakes which attract wildlife including otters, and environmental initiatives have encouraged barn owls and other apex predators.

The Wanlip herd of Longhorns was established in 2003 and is currently around 30 cows, with Mike wanting to build the herd to around 40 cows. All steers and some heifers are finished on the farm for supply to Roberts Butchers in nearby Mountsorrel which was bought by Mike in 2018.

Mike and his family own a number of other enterprises as well as the farm including Wanlip Sand & Gravel which also includes a green waste recycling operation, George Walker Ltd (timber merchants) in Syston, Belvoir Sawmill in Knipton and a carp fishing lake run by a syndicate. Mike is also a director of Melton Mowbray Market.

It was great to see so many members again, including some new members who hadn't had the opportunity to meet other breeders until now

At the evening meal on Saturday our after-dinner speaker was Alastair Sneddon from Bagshaws Auctioneers who had us all crying with laughter as he recalled tales from his time working as a land agent and auctioneer.

WINTER FAIRS







Thea Woollatt and the Saxby family took Longhorns to the English Winter Fair at Stafford in November and there were enough entries to have our own classes. In first and third were steers from the Saxbys, with Thea's heifer standing second. In the sale, the Saxby's steers, both 21 months old and weighing 665kg and 635kg respectively, made 270ppkg and 276kkpg.

The Saxbys also took steers to Holmfirth Market Xmas Show & Sale and had a first and a third in the Native class, with both animals selling to Albion Farm Shop for 318ppkg and 278ppkg.



SLOW COOKED SPICED BEEF PIE RECIPE

Slow-cooked spiced beef pie, by Rukmini Iyer.

This is such a gorgeous winter one-pot dish. Don't be alarmed by the long cooking time: the oven does the work, and this slow-cooked beef pie will look after itself with just a couple of short interventions from you. The amount of time you'll spend in the kitchen is minimal, which is exactly what you want when you've got friends over for drinks and dinner to celebrate the run-up to Christmas – and it really does look spectacular when it comes bubbling out of the oven.

Slow-cooked spiced beef pie

Prep 15 min, Cook 3 hr 5 min, Serves 4-6

For the filling

2 onions, thinly sliced 2 inches ginger, grated

4 cloves garlic, grated 800g beef stewing steak (Longhorn if possible!)

3 heaped tsp ras el hanout 1 tsp sea salt flakes 2 tbsp olive oil 400ml beef stock

1 x 400g tin tomatoes

For the topping

1kg maris piper potatoes, very thinly sliced80g butter, melted1 tsp sea salt flakes100g cheddar, grated

Freshly ground black pepper

To prepare, preheat the oven to 220C (200C fan)/425F/gas 7. Tip the onions, ginger, garlic, beef, ras el hanout, sea salt and olive oil into a wide-based casserole dish or roasting tin, and mix well. Rearrange the beef pieces so they form one layer on top, then transfer to the oven to brown for 20 minutes.

Turn the heat down to 170C (150C fan)/300F/gas 2. Remove the casserole dish from the oven, and add the beef stock and the tomatoes. Stir well, cover, then return to the oven for a further hour and a half.

Remove the dish from the oven, and turn the heat up to 190C (170C fan)/375F/gas 5. Mix the thinly sliced potatoes with the butter and salt in a large bowl, and arrange on top of the beef, pressing down gently to let the lower layers submerge in the cooking liquid.

Scatter over the grated cheese and freshly ground black pepper, and return to the oven for another hour and 15 minutes, until the potatoes are golden brown and cooked through.

Let it stand for 10-15 minutes, then serve up with some greens — I like a mix of garlicky spring greens and tenderstem broccoli. Pairs well with a Bordeaux or Argentinian Malbec.

DISBUDDED CATTLE

Following a rule change at the 2017 AGM, disbudded cows, heifers or bulls are eligible to compete in show classes for breeding cattle. Disbudded cattle may be shown at Society sales.

ON-FARM SOFTWARE

If you use an on farm cattle management software programme that can produce spreadsheet reports the office can now accept these and embed them into the Society registration software to produce your birth records and registrations. INBREEDING CO-EFFICIENT REPORT

Are you thinking of buying a new bull but you're not sure if he's too closely related to your cows? The Society can produce an inbreeding co-efficient report showing how 'inbred' calves out of your cows and by any specified bull or bulls will be. The report also gives the 'Breed Mean' so you can compare the inbreeding co-efficient of your chosen mating to that of the breed as a whole.

This is a free service, just let the office know the name of the bull or bulls and I'll do the rest.

SOCIETY SURVEY & CONTACT INFORMATION

The Society survey on the online Herdbook is live. The Society has a duty to maintain an accurate registry which can only be achieved if members keep their herd records with the Society up to date.

Please also check the contact details the Society holds for you so they are correct both online and in the printed Herdbook.



CHECK MATE

The Grassroots online Registry has launched a new feature which offers the ability to check for common ancestors in potential matings.

Called 'Check Mate' it can be found in the Manage my Animals Menu (top right of the screen)

Select any male and one of your own females Click on 'calculate' and you will be offered the four generation pedigree of the prospective offspring with common ancestors highlighted. Common ancestors who first appear in the first or second generation are in orange, in the third generation are yellow and the fourth are green.

The Society can still offer full kinship analysis, as we have always done on request, but **Check Mate** is a quick and easy way to check potential matings

Birth notifications

All male calves should be birth notified to the Society. This is free at any time unless a Beef Certificate is required (see below). Birth notification keeps the dam's calving record up to date, and any male under consideration for keeping entire as a potential stockbull MUST be birth notified before three months of age to comply with the full registration regulations.

BEEF CERTIFICATES

Beef certificates are £6. They are proof that your finishing animal is a pure-bred Longhorn should you need to offer such proof to a butcher, finisher, meat marketing scheme or restaurant. You can buy them when you notify your male calves by clicking on the 'with beef cert' option or if you decide you need one when your animal is finished then just contact the office.



TYPE CLASSIFICATION

In common with many other breeds the Longhorn Cattle Society offers Type Classification to its members.

Longhorn breeders have made huge strides in the last 20 or so years to improve their cattle through careful and selective breeding. Type classification provides an independent assessment of members' cattle in order to identify strengths and weaknesses within the herd and speed up breed improvement.

Type classification is also an excellent independent guide for new members who will be able to select cattle that have been assessed when establishing a herd if they wish.

Cattle are assessed by classifiers from NBDC who have been specially trained to classify beef cattle. Assessed on 14 different linear traits that make up four composite traits, a final score results in a grade from 'poor' to 'excellent'.

This grade is then appended to the animal's pedigree so anyone can see how an animal has been independently assessed. As the scheme develops multiple generations of cattle will be inspected and the results will inform members which cattle they should retain in their herd to improve the quality of both their herd and the national population.

The breeders that have had their animals classified so far have all reported that the process has been straightforward and very positive. These members, and a list of the cattle that have graded VG (Very Good) and EX (Excellent) are in the Knowledgebase on the website.
