A GUIDE TO THE HUSBANDRY OF A HERD OF LONGHORN CATTLE

Continuing our series of articles which was produced some years ago and is now re-printed here by kind permission

Selection of Bull Calves

With the arrival of the calves one must decide which will be suitable to retain for breeding. With reference to the bull calves I leave mine entire for two to three months before getting them steered, and I can then get a fair idea which are shaping up best.

Before rearing a bull there are several factors to consider. **Firstly, only the very best should be chosen, unless it is from a particularly important or rare bloodline. Secondly, a good growth rate in a beef herd is essential.** We in the Longhorn breed set a minimum of 950 lb (431 kg) at 400 days when we carry out a bull inspection.

When selecting a bull calf the points I look for, very briefly, are a good square rear end that is well meated, and length of rib that is evenly covered and a level top line. The legs and feet must also be considered; looking at the animal from behind when walking, his hind legs should be square and in line with this body and on no account should he cross his legs. The colour of the Longhorn is optional, but all should have a white line down the centre of the back and slight preference is given to red brindles and rich reds, and all to have a white patch on each thigh. He should in general have a masculine appearance.

Bull Management

When the bull is approximately twelve months old he will need to have a ring fitted through his nose. It is best to get the veterinary surgeon to do it. When getting the ring fitted do make sure it is not too small. It is much better to have one that is a little too large bearing in mind that at this stage the bull is still growing. When he has been fitted with the ring do not attempt to use it for leading for perhaps a fortnight or so otherwise his nose will become sore. It is a good idea to put a little grease on the ring and turn it regularly. Also if he is fed with hay through a mesh he will find it difficult, so until such time that it has healed it would be advisable for him to be fed directly on the floor or out of a manger. Another important point when keeping a bull inside is to make sure he is on a concrete or hard floor with just enough bedding straw for him to lie on and be comfortable. **Make sure he is well cleaned out as deep manure can be very detrimental to his feet and this is often the cause of bulls walking badly.**

Returning to the bull calves, it may be safer to separate these and their mothers, if space permits, from the rest of the herd at an early age as there can be a possibility of the young heifers bulling as early as four months and any that you may not have steered could quite easily serve these young heifers. It is, of course, as well to remember this if you have a herd sire running with the cows.

Creep Feeding

Because it is essential to make the most of all young stock from about two months onwards, the calves will need supplementary feeding, and for this you will need a creep feed. If you have only a few calves to feed, this need not be a very elaborate affair; it can be constructed from some gates with uprights at the front wide enough to enable the calves to get in and out. It is a swell to have some form of covering on the top in order to keep the food dry. When the calves are about two months old start them off with a handful of coarse mixture from a cattle feed merchant. This perhaps may appear a little expensive but the calves seem to enjoy it and proves to be a tempting food as a starter. Towards the autumn a small amount of sweet hay can be added to the diet. As they get into the habit of eating the coarse mixture, one can start to introduce cheaper concentrates—approximately up to 2 lb (1 kg) per day at weaning time.

New Forest Eye

With the warmer days ahead the animal's eyes must be closely watched for an eye infection known as New Forest Eye or New Forest Disease. This infection is connected with flies and can be cured fairly easily if immediate action is taken. The symptoms are that the eye becomes very watery followed by clouding over the pupil, and if left untreated can eventually cause blindness. The treatment used is either an antibiotic injection or ointment smeared onto the eye. The former is probably the quickest and most effective way to deal with the disease as one injection soon clears it up, whereas the ointment must be applied daily until cured.

Halter Training

Some heifers and perhaps all bulls need to be halter trained. One cannot start on them too young; once trained they never forget and to me the time and effort spent doing this certainly makes it worthwhile in the end and a pleasure to handle them. When the animals are approximately ten months old, I find the best way is to tie them up by a halter in a loose box or shed where they can be kept tied for a few days, making sure they have plenty of clean bedding under them and plenty of water and hay. Here they will be able to struggle without giving much trouble to you, but do make sure that the slip part of the halter is knotted in such a way that it cannot be pulled too tightly under its mouth, otherwise this would make difficulty in feeding. This should be checked regularly. Also tie the correct knot which can be released easily and make certain they have enough length to lie down. During this time try to handle them as much as possible, perhaps a little grooming with a stiff brush. The next step will be to lead them around the shed, and with a little patience and perseverance you will soon be able to walk the animal around outside. Although at the time this may seem a lot of tedious work, it is nevertheless a worthwhile exercise as the benefit will clearly be shown when either entering for show purposes or in a sale ring as the later trained animal is very much more attractive to a potential buyer.

First prize in the Cow class went to the younger of the two forward, a first calver with a nice January born calf at foot. The Senior Heifers again, were led by the youngest, an attractive heifer that walked well. The Junior Heifers caused some head scratching. I felt that I had to demote my first choice for a swelling on the hock which, although not affecting the action too badly, was a disfigurement that would not merit the red card.

The Female Championship and Reserve went to the first and second Senior Heifers. The Breed Championship I awarded to the bull with, unusually, the second prize bull being preferred to the females and standing reserve.

Cattle Tracing System (CTS)

British Cattle Movement Service (BCMS) is making a plea to all cattle keepers regarding the accuracy of the Cattle Tracing System (CTS). The UK seeks to have the beef ban lifted and make changes to the Over Thirty Months rule, both of which will benefit cattle owners. However, these moves could be hindered if the CTS is found to be inaccurate.

Cattle keepers are reminded that passports must be returned to BCMS once animals have died. This should be done within 7 days, but even if you have passports for animals that died longer ago than this, then you should still return the passports to BCMS. Provided that the passports have been returned voluntarily in this way, BCMS will simply record the details and no action will be taken for returning them late.

The message is: *If an animal has died, please return its paperwork...no matter how long its been dead.*

HOUGHTON HALL

Built in the 1720's by Britain's first Prime Minister, Houghton Hall is one of the grandest Palladian houses in England. Now lovingly restored to its former grandeur by the 7th Marquess of Cholmondeley, Houghton retains many of its original furnishings, allowing visitors the opportunity to step back in time and enjoy the house much as it would have been in Walpole's day.

The Hall sits at the centre of a vibrant 4,500 acres estate and includes the deer park of 450 acres which is home to over 600 of the famous white fallow deer and smaller groups of exotic deer, about 620 acres of woodland, and 3,100 acres of farmland. Visitors can also explore the much acclaimed 5 acres walled garden which has been beautifully restored and the stables which reflect the elegant age of riding and coach horses. The stables also house the Cholmondeley Soldier Museum.

The farmland is run in four units: two contract farming units, an organic unit and one tenant farmer. The contract farming operations are entirely arable with wheat, barley, OSR and sugar beet the main crops grown. In 2002 about 650 acres was taken out of the contract farming operation and a mixed farming organic unit was developed. A large areas to the west of the Hall was converted back into parkland where extensive tree planting and fencing has taken place in conjunction with Countryside Stewardship Schemes. The remaining organic land is farmed within an arable/clover rotation.

Livestock form an integral part of the organic unit. Initially Longhorn heifers came from the Cholmondeley Herd at Cholmondeley Castle in Cheshire and more recently heifers were purchased from the Eastburn Herd in Yorkshire. The herd now comprises 25 cows and the aim is to eventually increase this to 50 cows. The unit also has flocks of Norfolk Horn and South Down sheep. These breeds were chosen as it is known that both breeds were kept on the estate in the late 1700's. At present there are 200 ewes but again the aim is to increase numbers to about 450. An outdoor pig unit and a free range poultry unit also form part of the organic unit.

At present all the lamb and beef produced is sold directly from the farm through boxed schemes or at Fakenham farmers market. They also supply several restaurants and plans are underway to develop a farm shop.

The management of game and wildlife habitat on the estate has improved dramatically in recent years with the introduction of conservation and stewardship headlands, game cover crops and wise management of hedgerows. All game on the estate is completely wild and Houghton is one of the few Norfolk estates with a high enough density of English grey partridges to allow shooting.

Marketing

Council agreed to the production of a Breed Promotion DVD, with filming to take place over the summer and to involve as many members as possible. Council also agreed on the production of information to assist new members. New car stickers have been produced and will be available to members priced £1/each.

The website was reviewed and Council agreed that the site should be updated. Work would commence and be ongoing throughout the summer. It was agreed that breeders advertising in the journal should receive a free advertisement on the new website.

Sales

Council agreed a proposal for inspections at official sales. A society sale may comprise both official and unofficial sections, but in the official section cattle must be haltered, led and subject to inspection. The inspector will assess the animal against the breed standard and for its general health and condition. All inspected animals should be seen walking. Female animals which fail to satisfy the inspector may, at the vendor's option, be transferred to the unofficial section (if any) or removed from the market before the sale. Male animals which fail inspection must be removed from the sale. Only animals entered into the official section may also enter the pre-show sale, and the show should be judged in a ring, not pens. These rules take immediate effect and will apply at the next Society sale—i.e the National Show & sale at Melton Mowbray. (A full copy of these rules is obtainable from the secretary).
